

PIERRIER COMES BACK FOR GOOD

This bronze stone-firing cannon was one of 16 pierriers aboard La Boussole. A second pierrier was retrieved from the wreck-site and is among the relics in the possession of Reece Discombe.

It was a sparkling day at La Perouse, further enhanced by the presence of so many officers and sailors in their whiter than white uniforms, parading down the freshly-mown grass slopes.

The central instrument room of Cable Station, where the presentation took place, had been decorated for the occasion with naval banners and flags from the visiting French ships Amiral Charner and La Garonne.

The pierrier has been placed upstairs in the Museum's "King's Instructions" Room 6A, near the large Monsiau painting.

MUSEUM NEWS (information compiled for the benefit of the Friends by the Staff of the Museum)

The Museum has been the focus of attention for many activities and functions in the early part of this year. The number of visitors has been steadily increasing and, with various holiday and special programmes we are organising, this trend should continue.

In January, we conducted a four-week holiday programme for the whole of Botany Bay National Park at La Perou. This programme was a great success - offering guided tours of the park, a children's day and talks on the Aboriginal culture and history of La Perouse. The tours were conducted by our very enthusiastic Seasonal Ranger Tina Costanzo.

January ended with the presentation of the "pierrier" by the French Ambassador Mr Roger Duzer, and the wreath laying ceremony by the Captains of two visiting naval vessels Amiral Charner and La Garonne. It was a very colourful ceremony which included the Royal Australian Navy, Guards of Honour from the two ships and the R.A.N. The presentation received wide media coverage. The Friends generously provided refreshments for the occasion, and this was much appreciated.

A lot of interest has been shown by schools and community groups for tours of the museum and our reputation as an educational resource centre is growing. We hope to attract similar interest during Senior Citizens week from 6th - 13th May. We will be offering tours of the Museum to help make it more accessible and enjoyable to the elderly members of our community. Between 18th - 24th May, we hope to organise something special for Museum's Week, and on the 18th May we will take part in International Museum's Day. If this is an indication of how 1990 will progress, it looks like being a good year. We look forward to seeing you at the Museum.

BEING A MUSEUM FRIEND: WHAT IT MEANS

Everywhere, museums of all kinds, from the smallest village folk museum to the great museums in Capital cities, enjoy the support of "Friends". There is a world wide "Association of Friends" and a Congress every four years which is attended by delegates from around the world. "Friends" have an important role to play. Let us understand what that role is.

"Friends" are one of the five groups vitally concerned with museums. The others are the owners, the employees, the benefactors, and the public.

In the case of the Laperouse Museum, the Ownership of the Museum building and contents, the preservation and display of items, and the general administration are in the hands of the N.S.W. National Parks & Wildlife Service. Australia is indeed fortunate this heritage of ours is secure, safe and sound.

The Museum Staff are employed by the National Parks & Wildlife Service.

very generous and their support has resulted in a wonderful collection. Not only was money donated, but time and effort were freely given and the N.S.W. Department of Public Works carried out a restoration on the old Cable Station, which houses the Collection, that must be described as superb.

There is a companion booklet available at the Museum which outlines its historical background.

Some museums, particularly technical ones like the Power House, never finish collecting. New versions of types already in the museum must be acquired, to keep upto-date, and sometimes an earlier version of a series of artifacts turns up and falls into the hands of the museum curators.

Other museums relate to specific items or periods. This type includes, for instance, American Civil War Museums and the Museum at Waterloo! The Laperouse Museum belongs to this group.

So, what of the Friends of the Laperouse Museum? First of all, we have an Official Charter, and this is lodged with the N.S.W. Department of Business & Consumer Affairs. The documents are called the "Memorandum" and "Articles of Association".

The "Friends" is a "Corporation limited by guarantee of \$100 by each member" and has been established to help the Museum. The "Articles of Association" control the way the organization is run, such as the conduct of Annual meetings and the election of Officers.

To help the museum, the "Friends" can do all manner of things of interest to the members. Any profits generated from our efforts go directly or indirectely to the

Museum; they cannot be distributed to the members. All donations, not the cost of functions or entertainment, are Tax deductible.

Now that the Museum is established, it is vital that the "Friends of the Laperouse Museum" play their role in building upon the work of the predecessor organization, "The Laperouse Association for the Australian Bicentenary" which made the Museum possible.

The Committee of the Friends plans to develop a calendar of events. The best way to have a worthwhile calendar is for each and every member to make suggestions and volunteer to help. First of all take a minute to write to the President or a member of the Committee to pass on ideas. Remember, "Friends of the Laperouse Museum" have a special window that opens to a view of all that is best in France, the people, the culture,

the history, and access to other Museums and Institutions such as the great Musee de la Marine in Paris, and the Laperouse Museum in Albi, near Toulouse.


The Laperouse Museum is very special. It encapsulates a coincidence as strange, at the time, as if the Russians were to meet accidentally the Americans in space.



CURATORIAL NOTES

The past three months have seen the arrival of two important acquisitions at the museum. The presentations have attracted attention, and through such events public awareness of the museum has increased.

The first of our recent acquisitions, a bronze sculpture of Laperouse, made in 1989 by Canberra artist Ante Dabro, was unveiled on 12th December last year. Presented by Mr Gough Whitlam on behalf of the National Council for the Celebration of the Bicentenary of the French Revolution, the maquette or small bust stands 30cm high and was modelled from 17th and 18th century images of Laperouse. Its contemporary style contrasts with the large formal bust from the original by Rude already on display.

The second item received at the museum recently is a small cannon, or "pierrier", from the flagship of the Laperouse expedition La Boussole. The pierrier was given to the museum as a permanent loan by the French Navy based in New Caledonia on the occasion of the visit of two naval vessels in Sydney on 30th January this The pierrier weighing vear. approximately 68 kilos and measuring one metre long was retrieved from the wreck site at Vanikoro in 1964 by the French Navy. In addition, three 20th Century charts of Vanikoro were presented to the Museum by Captain Laudet of La Garonne.

In the next few months, I am planning to replace the ten maps from the Australian Bank map collection and the long awaited tapestry should arrive and be prepared for display. It is very pleasing to be able to develop the collection with both contemporary and historical material of specific relevance to the story of Laperouse and French exploration in the Pacific, and to provide even regular visitors with something new and interesting to illuminate this forgotten aspect of Australian history.

WE MADE IT!

It took three years of discussions and promotion by the Friends, and in particular Pierre Roussel, to obtain from the French Navy the "return" of the pierrier (small cannon) to Botany

Many people have to be thanked for this generous contribution. The very first one is Amiral Louzeau, Chief of Staff of the French Navy. He knew of our hopes when he came to visit the Museum over Christmas 1988, being aware that Amiral Bergot, commander of the Pacific Fleet, had already approached the Naval Base in Noumea on our behalf.

Our staunchest supporter and 'godfather' Commandant Director of the Musee de la Mai(Paris, had also brought up the subject with him at every opportunity. So when Pierre Roussel took the Admiral on a conducted tour of the Museum, it was enough ...! Admiral Louzeau was more than pleased with what he saw.

Early in 1989, a telex arrived at the French Embassy in Canberra advising the Defence Attache, Jean-Jacques Then, that the "pierrier" was to be offered to the Museum, on permanent loan, and taken there on Laperouse Day, i.e. 23rd February, 1990.

The ceremony had to take place on 30th January to fit in with the schedule of the French Ambassador who officially handed over the small cannon to the National Parks & Wild' Services, custodian of the Museum's treasures.
